Welcome to the 4K Preschool program in the School District of La Crosse! We are so excited that your child will join us for the 2023-2024 school year! Our 4K Preschool program will provide your child with a high-quality 4-year-old preschool experience. Whether your child is enrolled in 4K Preschool within one of our school buildings or a community partner site, your child will be learning and growing through play and hands-on activities.

The School District of La Crosse 4K Preschool, along with the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI), points to the importance of play as an integral way for young children to learn. Meaningful learning that is child-initiated and hands-on is the way young children learn and grow. In early childhood education, the concept of play does not mean every child is doing exactly the same thing. 4K Preschool students will receive different supports, provided by knowledgeable early childhood educators, to individualize the benefits of play.

The 4K Preschool program believes that families know their child best! We look forward to partnering with you to make your child's first school experience a positive one. Family engagement is an important part of our program. Your child's teacher will send you information throughout the year on ways to volunteer, get involved, and participate in learning and fun at school.

A strong emphasis is placed on your child's social and emotional development while in our 4K Preschool program. We use the Wisconsin Model Early Learning Standards (WMELS), High Scope Curriculum (a play-based resource), and the Pyramid Model practices to guide our teaching. Your child will learn not only how to be a friend but how to recognize and manage strong emotions.

Next, you will receive information from your child's teacher that is specific to their site and program. You will also be invited to participate in an open-house before school begins. The following information is to help answer some basic questions about our 4K Preschool Program and provide some guidance about how to help your child with the transition to 4K Preschool.

In the meantime, please don't hesitate to reach out with any questions. We look forward to working with your child and family this coming school year.

What to Expect in 4K Preschool

Your child's daily schedule will be unique depending on their location, but you can always expect that your child will experience hands-on, playful learning opportunities during their time with us. The 4K Preschool classroom is set up to be engaging and fun with different learning centers such as blocks, books, dress-up/dolls, outside play, cars and kitchen area. There will be singing, dancing, laughing and learning together.

School Communication

You will receive a communication from your school approximately 4-6 weeks before your child's 4K Preschool start date. It will have information about open house, school supplies, snacks, etc. and throughout the year, your child's teacher will give you a progress report update on how your child is learning and growing. You will also be offered a Parent-Teacher conference to talk more about your child's strengths and progress.

Developmental Screening with ASQ & ASQ:SE

Because your child's first 5 years of life are so important, we want to help you provide the best start for your child. You'll be invited to participate in the Ages & Stages Questionnaires, Third Edition (ASQ-3) & Ages & Stages Questionnaire: Social Emotional (ASQ:SE) to help provide information on your child's development. Information will come from your child's teacher with a link to the online screener and takes less than 10 minutes to complete. You will be asked to answer questions about some things your child can and cannot do. The questionnaire includes questions about your child's communication, gross motor, fine motor, problem solving, and personal social skills. Your child's teacher will discuss the results with you and any next steps. If you have ongoing developmental concerns about your child, you can request a more in-depth specialized developmental evaluation at any time by contacting the EC/4K Program Coordinator at 608-789-7621.

Can My Child Repeat 4K Preschool?

No, the 4K Preschool Program is a one-year experience before your child begins 5-Year-Old Kindergarten.


While we'd love to keep your child for more than one year (...let's face it, teachers get attached!), it's board policy that 4K Preschool is a "one and done" experience before 5-Year-Old Kindergarten begins. Your child will have all the foundation skills from 4K Preschool to be successful in 5K the following Year.

"Ready" for 4K Preschool?

Is your child "ready" for 4K Preschool? Here are some tips to help their 4K Preschool experience be successful:

- •Play and read with your child every day! Point to pictures in a book, take a walk and talk about what you see, try new things and have fun.
- •Your child will need a good night's sleep and daily routine in order to keep up with the learning fun in 4K Preschool! A regular and early bedtime routine will help your child be ready to learn and grow.
- •Talk to your child a lot! Ask questions about their daily activities and get them excited for school!
- •Potty Training- being independent with bathroom skills is important for preschoolers. If your child is not quite potty trained yet- that's okay! Please let your 4K Teacher know how your child is doing with potty training and what works well for your child at home.

B is for Bedtime & Books

→ Preschool-aged children need 10-12 hours of sleep per day for proper brain development. Curling up for bedtime after reading a great book is a great way to set up a routine.

C is for Caring.

→ We care about your child AND your family!

D is for Diversity.

E is for Experiences.→ Children gain knowledge from difference experiences and exposure both at home and at school.

Preschool is fun; we encourage singing, dancing, exploring, and cooperative play.




K is for Kindne → Model kind words and actions when



When should your child stay home because of illness?

FEVER: greater than 100 degrees

VOMITING: return 24 hours after vomiting DIARRHEA: return 24 hours after diarrhea

RASH: rash that is open and draining or a rash with a fever

STREP THROAT, IMPETIGO: return after 24 hours of treatment with antibiotic

SCABIES, **RINGWORM**: must be treated before returning to school

CHICKEN POX: child may return to school 5-7 days after onset of rash, with all sores dry and scabbed over

 $m{\mathscr{Z}}$ Please contact your child's school if you have any questions regarding the above.

Please notify your child's school if your child is absent due to illness or injury.

If your child has a serious illness or injury that affects school participation, please notify your school principal or school nurse so a plan can be implemented to meet your child's needs.

ILLNESS OR INJURY AT SCHOOL: Students who become ill or injured at school will be seen in the health room by trained staff. If your child is unable to return to class, a parent will be contacted. For your child's comfort please make arrangements to pick them up as soon as possible.

MEDICATIONS:

Please give medications at home whenever possible. If medication is needed during the school day, the following is necessary.

Prescription Medication

(1) A doctor's signature with written instruction.

(2) Written consent from the parent for the school to give the medication.

(3) Medication is in a properly labeled prescription bottle.

Non-prescription Medication

Written consent from the parent with instructions for the school to give the medication.

Medication must be in the original container.

Students may not carry medication at school with the exception of prescription inhalers and epinephrine auto injectors with a doctor's written permission.

Parents/guardians are requested to please deliver medication to the school office.

REMINDER:

A new medication form is needed each time the medication is changed.

A new medication form is needed for each school year.

Procedure forms are available at your school office, school website or local clinic.

ENROLLMENT FORM AND EMERGENCY INFORMATION

It is important for us to reach you if your child is ill or injured at school. Please complete the Annual Health Update Form and enrollment form from school, listing parent's name with work and home phone numbers, along with two local emergency contacts. Call your child's school with any changes throughout the school year.

HEALTH AND SCREENING PROGRAMS

Physical Examinations:

It is recommended that Kindergarten students have physical, dental and vision examinations prior to school entrance.



Vision Screening:

School District Nurses, along with parent volunteers and the Lions Club, provide a vision **screening** program at your child's school for students in Preschool, Kindergarten, 1, 3 and 5. Your help would be greatly appreciated—call your child's school office if you are interested in volunteering to help with vision screening.

IMMUNIZATIONS

"IT'S THE LAW" s.252.04 Wis. Stats.

This law requires students through grade 12 to be immunized according to their age/grade by the beginning of the school year.

Immunization is a shared responsibility:

- Parents are required to have their children immunized on schedule and keep accurate records. If a student is unable to receive immunizations for medical, religious or personal conviction reasons, a waiver must be signed and given to the school.
- Schools are required to keep records and review annually the Immunization Law.
- When students do not meet the requirements of the law, parents are notified by a legal notice.



Helpful Hints:

Keep a copy of your child's immunization record. Notify your child's school each time your child receives an immunization. Call your school office if you have any questions.
